Mites in Action Speakers Bring Joy

Are you like me, always happy to hear a Mites in Action speaker at convention, retreat, or at a Zone Rally?

You would not have been disappointed at the 38th Biennial LWML Convention in Mobile.

The dream of establishing an eldercare Lutheran Village in Haiti came to fruition after an LWML grant was God provided, as explained by Mission in Motion President, Jaclyn Rychel. Then stories of healing, both physically and spiritually, were encapsulated in word and picture by Stephanie Schulte who told of nursing students serving with Mercy Medical Teams.

Next, attendees were at first puzzled when Lynn Corker, from Women of the Pearl in Uganda, told everyone "It's your fault." She explained never having a desire to be in Uganda, let alone play an integral part in the women receiving literacy education, rising to become business owners, and taking back their villages by spreading the love of Jesus with their neighbors. Through an LWML grant the first class of 24 young men will be graduating from the new seminary these funds provided. "And it's all your fault!"

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. And he will place the sheep on his right, but the goats on the left. Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick

and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.' - Matthew 25:31 – 47

Love is an action word, and I invite you to action. Could you collect over-the-counter medical supplies for Concordia Theological Seminary's LWML Cabinet in Fort Wayne, IN.? Katherine Rittner, Director of Food & Clothing Co-op at Concordia Theological Seminary, invites LWML societies to collect gift cards in \$10.00, \$20.00, or \$25.00 increments for Walmart, Kroger, Target, Meijer, JC Penney, or restaurant chains such as Applebee's, Cracker Barrel, McDonald's, Olive Garden, Pizza Hut, Subway, Texas Roadhouse, or Wendy's. Gift cards and quilts are shared with the students before they leave for Christmas break in December. The Food coop is currently able to supply between 80% and 85% of all food and household needs each month at no cost to the students. It operates as an actual cooperative with each family volunteering their time.

Zone Presidents are invited to bring your donations to the September 14th Board of Directors' meeting at St. John's in North Prairie or to the Fall Retreat on September 19-21; from there items will be taken to Fort Wayne in October for celebration of LWML Donation Days at CTSFW.

Cleansed

Spring and Fall is a perfect time to clean our churches. Members band together and wash windows, wipe tables, and remove the cobwebs off the altar cross. But the biggest job usually involves cleaning out a church storage closet. After six months, odds and ends pile up. The church closet becomes the junk room, filled with things that *might* get used in the future. Closets are hard to clean because we instinctively want to hold on to everything. We think we're being unfaithful stewards if we throw out an old coffee maker or old Sunday School materials. But in truth, some things just need to go.

Dear people of God, we need to be cleaned out as well! In the Old Testament, a sacrificial system was instituted. By His grace, the Lord provided a way for His people to be cleansed. God's people knew they were an unholy people living under a holy God. How could they possibly atone for their dirtiness? How could these unfaithful Israelites possibly be made right before their faithful God? It was through sacrifice. An animal, such as a lamb, was sacrificed as a substitute for the people's imperfections. Through the shedding of blood, God's people were purged of all sinful offenses that polluted themselves before God. And through the animal's death God's people were *cleansed*.

God knew His children needed to be cleansed. Like that church closet, we also are full. We are full of too much hypocrisy, jealousy, doubt, and fear. We are a sinful people that must be cleaned out. How can we possibly be made right with God? The truth is, we cannot do it on our own. Thanks be to God, who sent Jesus Christ as the great and final sacrifice. We today do not bring our lambs to the church. Instead, we enter God's house to receive the forgiveness won by the perfect Lamb, Jesus Christ. Jesus Himself was "without stain...holy and blameless" (Eph. 5:27). Again, St. Paul writes, "Christ loved us and gave Himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God" (Eph 5:2). On the cross, He did it all. Jesus paid for all sins and cleansed us from all unrighteousness.

This is wonderful Good News! We've been cleansed! Our sins have been atoned for. All the things that kept us away from God have been removed. The Kingdom of Heaven has been opened for us by the death and Easter resurrection of our Lord Christ. After Jesus' death at Calvary, there was no more need for a sacrificial altar. Instead we have an altar of blessing. We do not enter the church to sacrifice. Instead, we come into the church to receive God's love, His forgiveness, Word, peace, and Holy Supper. Instead of walking up to the temple with an animal, we kneel at the rail, ready to receive Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of our sins. Along with Psalmist we confess "Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin" (Ps. 51:2). The cross is our salvation. By faith in the perfect Lamb of God we are saved. The final sacrifice has been made. This means we have been cleaned out. Rejoice, we have been cleansed!



I quickly (and sneakily) found Patti, who gave me a big smile and hug, her signature, and pointed out the pastoral counsellor, who happily signed my scavenger hunt and pointed out an election candidate, who took the time to chat and walk through the convention halls with me just in case she recognized any other people I needed! Ladies! This was absolutely the love and joy of Christ shining through

these busy people. For the next three days I was surrounded by love: during the meetings and services (which included serving communion to 3,000 people), during our early-morning and late-night YWR meetings, and while joining a multitude of voices singing in praise to the Lord!

Now, ladies of the SWD, I challenge you to bring this love and community to your churches and societies in Wisconsin. If it weren't for Kati's passion and encouragement I wouldn't have been at the convention this year! Your society can be a powerful community: "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). If you're disappointed by small numbers or participation, remember "For where two or three gather in my name, there am I among them" (Matthew 18:20). Remember to pray for the LWML and your society because "My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth" (Psalm 121:2). LWML Sets 2019–2021 Mission Goal at \$2.1 Million

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) welcomed 3104 people with 691 as first timers to the LWML Convention in Mobile, Alabama, June 20–23, 2019, under the theme "In Praise to the LORD!" The convention theme was based on 1 Chronicles 16:23–24a. Delegates to the 38th Biennial Convention of the LWML adopted a \$2,100,000 mission goal for the 2019–2021 biennium. This goal, by the grace of God, will fund 21 mission grants as men and women respond in prayer and offerings during the next two years. LWML chose to support the following mission grants, pledging their support with prayers and mites (offerings) given over the next biennium:



What's Happening in Your Zone

Even though the Phoebe Society (Zone 8) takes a break from holding regular business meetings in the summer, that doesn't mean they take a vacation from serving the Lord with gladness. In May, this LWML group at Trinity Lutheran Church-Town Wilson initiated a congregation-wide donation drive for Anchor of Hope. An educational display was set up in the church narthex, and Anchor of Hope's Executive Director shared details about the organization's mission work following a Sunday morning worship service.



To get the donation drive started, the Phoebe Society purchased 25 official 2017 LWML Convention beanie bears for Anchor of Hope's Boutique. This is a place

where clients who've completed "Earn While You Learn" parenting classes may spend their earned Baby Bucks to make purchases in the Boutique. The congregation joined the Phoebe Society in donating items on a "Boutique Needs" list. To boost enthusiasm for the donation drive, the Phoebe Society added fun incentives for givers.

Whenever someone donated \$2.50, he/she had the privilege of naming a beanie bear. Names were written on stickers and attached to the tag on each bear's ear. The Phoebe Society could "bearly" wait to see what creative names would be chosen! Anyone naming a bear received a treat bag containing gummy bears and teddy grahams. Those who visited the Anchor of Hope display could also participate in guessing the number of whale crackers in a bottle contest to win a gift card.

By the end of June, a carload of donations, the beanie bears, and a cash gift were delivered to Anchor of Hope.

Another Phoebe Society activity in June was to tour Project Angel Hugs to learn about that non-profit and to color greeting cards for children with cancer. On July 14th, the Phoebe Society and Trinity's Evangelism Committee teamed up to host a first-ever Mitey Mission Project Day after the morning worship service. The Phoebe Society had its big Mite Box out to collect mite offerings. After enjoying some refreshments, participants explored the eight mission stations set up in the Fellowship Hall.

A project leader at each station engaged participants in hands-on project-making while explaining how the finished product would be used for missions. The projects were: Witness Bracelets and Eyeglass Cases for MOST Ministries; Baby Care Kits for Lutheran World Re-

lief; Greeting Cards for Project Angel Hugs; "Plarn" to make Sleeping Mats for Orphan Grain Train; Clothing Protectors for Bethesda Lutheran



Communities; and Mixes in Jars and Decorative Candle Holders for Trinity Lutheran Church fundraising.

The efforts of young and old church members working together that morning produced 30 Baby Care Kits, 10 Witness Bracelets, 10 Eyeglass Cases, 25 Greeting Cards, 13 Candle Holders, 14 Jar Mixes, and four Clothing Protectors. The event concluded with lunch, courtesy of Thrivent Action Team and Texas Roadhouse. "Working for the Lord above" (from the LWML song) makes the Phoebe Society mighty indeed!


