Dear Sisters in the LWML SWD,

A few months ago someone asked me a question about "convention" and I asked them, "Which convention?" With three conventions on my mind for the past year (LWML in Lexington 2021, LWML SWD on June 18, 2022, in Grafton, and the LWML 2023 in Milwaukee), please be sure to identify the convention YOU are referencing so we are both focusing on the same one!

In this issue of the Mission Lamp you will enjoy reading about the LWML Convention in Lexington as writers share their convention highlights and LWML "how tos" to encourage you as an LWML sister. Each article shares convention highlights for the individual writer. A personal favorite of mine is the Parade of Flags. Heart to Heart sisters and



others carry the flag from countries where an LWML Mission Grant was received. This year the parade had 82 flags including six new flags representing: Cambodia, Cameroon, Macau, Malawi, Rwanda, and Zambia. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations," (Matt. 28:19a).

Additional Lexington statistics include: registration just over 2800, including 72 from SWD; opening service including 60 pastors participating in communion distribution; and King's Kids, the child care program, with 45 participants, nursery through teens. An itemized list of Gifts from the Heart is found in eNews 342 on *lwml.org* and be sure to watch the 2021-2023 Mission Grants video also posted on *lwml.org*. Consider watching the convention at *LWML on Livestream*.

Special thanks to all who contributed Lexington Convention articles. Many are in this issue of the Mission Lamp, some will be shared in coming issues, and all the articles will be archived! Celebrating Mary

On August 15, the Church celebrates the life of Mary. She should be celebrated! Mary spoke to the angel, and her heart burst with joy knowing Christ was in her womb. At the home of Zechariah she prophesied to Elizabeth that she carried within her the Savior of the nations (Lk. 1:39-56). When studying the story of Noah's ark, we know how all the world was saved because God placed a small group and their animals in a boat. The boat carried the world's salvation for 40 days and 40 nights. Mary understood that her womb was a new kind of ark. She went on to sing "My soul magnifies the Lord' (Lk. 1:46). Within her body she housed the One who would save humanity from the flood of eternal death. At the birth of Christ, the shepherds arrived and Joseph remained faithful by her side. The angels sang (Lk.2) of Jesus' glory. Mary remained with Jesus for years.

First there was Simeon singing his song, "Lord now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace" (Lk. 2:29). The wise men would bring their gifts and then Mary fled with the Holy Family to avoid Herod's sword. She later attended the Cana wedding and saw the water turned into wine. Unfortunately, the wine would turn sour for her son. Her son would taste the bitter wine from a cross. And when the sword

was run into Christ it was also run into her. This is the kind of heartache she suffered (Lk. 2:35). Thanks be to God, every promise of Christ was made true three days later! The tomb was found empty. She saw her risen Lord and told of His resurrection. Her life is a life worth celebrating!

We do not pray directly to Mary and we do not worship her. If we worshiped Mary we would actually be dishonoring her! Consider her life. It was a life that lived for Christ; her son and Savior. She never asked for worship and she knew redemption was never in her hands. She is worth remembering because she remained faithful beside Jesus, in times of victory and times of absolute loss. She carried Jesus in her womb. But Jesus did the greater work. Jesus carried His cross for Mary. During August, remember Mary and honor her. She needs no worship. Worship belongs to Jesus. By Baptism you are a part of a new Holy Family, the family of Jesus. In the life to come you will see Mary and Joseph and all the faithful. You will be in that heavenly place because of the work of Christ alone. Come let us adore Him! Amen.

Mission Grant Reflections...from Lexington

Pre-convention seminars were offered at the LWML convention, covering several topics. As the newly appointed Mission Grants Chairman for the SWD, I attended the seminar on mission grant proposals. Representatives from LWML and the LCMS Office of Missions were on hand to review the process of preparing grant proposals and answer questions from those in attendance. They stressed the importance of carefully following the guidelines for submitting grant proposals and closely considering the criteria that proposals must meet. We know that the needs of the mission field are many, but we must be sure that projects which ask for help are sustainable and most importantly that they serve to spread the gospel.

As our district convention 2022 nears, now is the time to consider submitting grants for our next biennium. A representative from the Synod Office of Missions reminded us that mission projects do not necessarily need to be overseas or even across the country. In recent years, God has brought the mission field to our backyards. Many local and inner city congregations are in desperate need of assistance. Talk with your local pastors, church leaders, and others that may know of needs in your communities.

Check the grant proposal guidelines available at *Iwml-swd.org* under the resources tab — district helps — forms. The first form listed is Guidelines for submitting LWML SWD grant proposals. If you are not sure about how to write a grant, please contact me and I will help or find someone who can. The deadline for submitting grants to be considered at the 2022 convention is October 31, 2021, but proposals will be considered at any time, sooner is better.

Convention: A Mountaintop Experience

How many of us have had a mountaintop experience before? A time where we have been wholeheartedly inspired? A time where we have had to work hard to endure a lot to get to the finish line? Linda Reiser, past LWML president and the keynote speaker at this year's convention, contends that people have felt a mountaintop experience before, where we have made significant connections and have been inspired by the people or events we have been a part of, but have we really looked at God's purpose for putting us in or at these events? What does God want us to take away from this experience? What does He want us to do with this experience? These questions get at the purpose or the intentions of why this mountaintop experience was given to us. We need to share what we have learned with others. This work of sharing our experiences or doing our next service for our Lord is done in the valleys of the mountains.

Linda began her address by telling us about the annual 5K run on July 4 in Seward, Alaska, that goes up a mountain and down the other side. With no fixed course, runners endure rocks, mud, and tundra; it is a dangerous run, so why do they do it? They do it because this is a mountaintop experience in their lives. God gives us many examples of mountaintop experiences in the Bible to understand and learn from, like when Moses went to the mountain to talk to God or when Elijah stood before God on the mountaintop. Jesus even gave us a sermon to remember for all time on a mountain. Linda stressed that it is a view from the mountain which makes all the difference in our lives. It is attending a convention, participating in a workshop, studying God's word. participating in mission pledge walks. It is the people we meet who mentor and inspire us. It is the new insightful view from the mountaintop which moves us to act, but "our hard work is in the valley." She reminded everyone that none of us is here by chance and that "God has a purpose for you," so think about what the purpose is for the mountaintop experiences in your life, and then get into the valley and go to work!

Convention: Seminars

What Does An Archivist-Historian Do?

Archivist-Historian collects An historical documents or records providing information about a place, institution, or group of people. My purpose is to collect information about the LWML SWD, so I collect rally programs, executive committee and board of directors minutes and reports, mission lamps, mission grants, convention manuals and any other printed materials that have to do with the district. I also write a biennium report to be included in the convention manual describing the activities in the district. I'm often asked, "Who really looks at the archives?" Archives are helpful when a society or district is celebrating an anniversary or when names of past officers are needed. I also make displays for the Winter Getaway, the Fall Retreat, and the district convention.

I attended the Archivist-Historian seminar at the Lexington Convention which was led by Caroline Honeycutt, Synodical LWML Archivist-Historian. The following items should be archived: executive board and rally meeting minutes, newsletters, workshop printed materials, and prayer services. Photo albums from retreats and conventions are saved for future events and for the joy of reminiscing. I have learned much about the women who serve in the LWML SWD, and they are truly talented and inspirational Christian women!

Structure Committee Seminar

The two-hour seminar that I attended at the Lexington convention was led by the LWML Structure Committee and covered guidelines for electronic meetings. In the last 1½ years we have all discovered electronic ways to carry on our business. Our bylaws MUST specifically authorize alternative (electronic) meetings. We discussed why electronic meetings should be allowed and some of the rules for electronic meetings (e.g., only in certain situations or all the time and for all levels of the organization, or only certain types of meetings)?

If current bylaws do not authorize alternative meeting formats, decisions that are made at such meetings can be ratified at the next 'legal' meeting by a motion. Other considerations that may come into the decision to hold electronic meetings may include the disadvantage of members who are not tech savvy; the loss of community;

technical assistance for large meetings; recording the meeting and taking minutes; difficulty in taking secret ballots.

An organization's bylaws should cover the basics. This would be the structure that would not be changed frequently, such as authorizing alternative meetings. At the end of the bylaws may be a list of standing rules. These would include some operations that may be subject to change as the organization operates, such as what the procedures of an electronic meeting would be. The standing rules are approved at convention and can be suspended as needed. The organization's secretary should keep the list of standing rules up to date.

The seminar gave us the opportunity to ask questions of the Structure Committee. Whenever SWD needs to amend our bylaws, they must be approved by the LWML Structure Committee since they have to be in line with the LWML bylaws.

Partners in Mission: Pastors, Church Workers, and LWML Impacting Lives

We were introduced to the Church Workers in Mission Committee, which is chaired by Christie Steffens and also includes Molly Dixon and DCE Kristina Parker. We viewed the LWML Church Workers in Mission video (under 3 minutes) which can be found on *Iwml.org* under Service. Is there a barrier between church workers and the LWML ladies? There shouldn't be! Does your LWML ministry plan align with your church's ministry plan? To begin the discussion, we were asked to consider four questions:

- 1) What do you/your LWML group do when you have a new church worker at your church/ school to reach out to the new worker?
- 2) What does your LWML group do to reach out to the wife of your male church worker? How do you make her feel welcome (not something that is part of her "job" because of who she is married to)?
- 3) How can the LWML help you as a church worker, or how can the LWML help you to support church workers in your area?
- 4) Are there any resources that LWML might be able to provide that would fill a need for you as a church worker serving in your context?

Why Households Matter: Lutheran Hour Ministry Presentation

When I chose the Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM) for my luncheon speaker, I expected to hear a report on LHM mission throughout the world. What I didn't expect was to actually experience that mission outreach myself. Ashley Bayless did a wonderful job filling in for Rev. Dr. Michael Ziegler, who at the last minute was unable to come.

Through Ashley's presentation we learned why households matter. God relates to us as individuals and as congregations. God also relates to us as households. Did you know God mentions households more than 2,100 times in the Bible? Households have rituals and relationships, but what makes a spiritually vibrant household? There are three core habits that foster a spiritually vibrant household. These are (1) applying spiritual disciplines, (2) extending hospitality, and (3) engaging in spiritual conversations.

Spiritual disciplines would be things like praying together every day or two, reading the Bible together at least weekly, and having nonfamily visitors often. It is easier to engage in spiritual conversation when children are in the household, but when people extend hospitality to others they have more discussions about God and faith. One fact that really stood out to me was the households that engage in spiritual conversations were more likely to do other things together.

In closing, Ashley challenged us to a 30-day devotion challenge. *Lhm.org* has many resources available to help you have a spiritually vibrant household. You will find these resources under the Barna+LHM tab; then click on Households of Faith.

Rev. Zagore: LCMS Office of Nation Mission

Rev. Zagore shared that "Making Disciples for Life" is to focus on making disciples and not just another binder provided by Synod. This plan is to change how we create, identify, distribute and prioritize resources for congregations.

The biggest questions members have is — will the church be there when needed and will my children go to heaven?

The responsibility of the church is to (1) evangelize the lost, (2) retain the faithful, (3) strengthen congregations (trust the Holy Spirit for guidance with this), and (4) plant new churches and schools (this is a mission we shouldn't forget). Is your church's plan to just survive or to grow? We are sent by God and not a victim of this world.

Rev. Zagore suggested not scrapping all your churches programs, but tweak and make the most of those that are working and seek resources through *makingdisciples.lcms.org*. This is a resource of shared information from individuals, congregations, districts and synods to help guide and strengthen your church. Another recommendation he suggested listening to is our Lutheran Radio at *kfuo.org*. He mentioned the podcasts of Friends for Life, but I also learned at the LWML Convention that the Lutheran Ladies Lounge is very popular with our women.

At the luncheon, I learned a couple resources from an LWML sister. Her church drew members into returning to Bible study through relaxed settings. For the men, they met at an establishment for Bible and Brew, the ladies Wine, Women and the Word (WWW).



What's in a Card?

It began in February 2009 with an opportunity to make cards for shut-ins which was approximately 70 cards. Several members made samples and provided materials to make Valentines. The cards were delivered by the pastors as they made visits. Soon we were branching out to make Spring and Easter cards. Extra cards were offered to our members to send to family and friends.

In November 2015 we began making cards for our Veterans to coincide with the Veteran's Day celebrations held by our day school children. Cards were given out at the Veteran's Breakfast. Everyone has a job regardless of their experience with cardmaking. A Thrivent Action Team Grant has assisted in purchasing a display rack and table located in the Gathering Hall. With the remaining funds, additional tools and supplies were purchased.

Cards can be purchased by a free will offering. All monies collected go to Mite projects. A large Mite Box graces the display indicating the current project. To date, the display and cards have been well received. The biggest winners are the Mite projects! To God be the Glory!




